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12 Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to health and safety concerns resulting in  
13 substantial operational impediments, and the proclamations of states of emergency by federal,  
14 state, and local officials, it was determined that the conditions described in Government Code  
15 section 68115 were met with regard to the Superior Court of California, County of San Mateo as  
16 of March 16, 2020; April 1 and 10, 2020; May 14, 2020 and June 11, 2020. At this Court's  
17 request, the Chief Justice of the California Supreme Court issued five prior emergency orders,  
18 authorizing the San Mateo County Superior Court to implement certain relief pursuant to  
19 Government Code section 68115. Upon the renewed request of this Court, the Chief Justice has  
20 determined that the conditions, as described in Government Code section 68115, continue to  
21 exist. (Gov. Code, § 68115(b). See attached Order.) Therefore, this Court orders the following:

23 •Court sessions may be held anywhere in the county, including in correctional and juvenile  
24 detention facilities, from July 15, 2020 to August 31, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, §  
25 68115(a)(1));  
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1 •July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive, are deemed holidays for purposes of computing  
2 time under Welfare and Institutions Code sections 313, 315, 334, 631, 632, 637, and 657 (Gov.  
3 Code, § 68115(a)(5));

5 •The time period provided in section 1382 of the Penal Code for the holding of a criminal trial is  
6 extended by 30 days, applicable only to cases in which the original or previously extended  
7 statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 15, 2020 to August 31, 2020, inclusive.  
8 (Gov. Code §68115(a)(10); Executive Order N-38-20 (3/27/20));

10 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 313 of the Welfare and Institutions Code  
11 within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be released from  
12 custody to five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would  
13 expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));  
14

15 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 315 of the Welfare and Institutions Code  
16 within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be given a  
17 detention hearing to five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline  
18 otherwise would expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, §  
19 68115(a)(11));  
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
21 •The Court extends the time periods provided in sections 632 and 637 of the Welfare and  
22 Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending wardship proceedings and  
23 charged with a felony offense must be given a detention hearing or rehearing to five days,  
24 applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 13,  
25 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));

27 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 334 of the Welfare and Institutions Code  
28 within which a hearing on a juvenile dependency petition must be held by 15 days, applicable

1 only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 13, 2020 to  
2 August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)); and

4 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 657 of the Welfare and Institutions Code  
5 within which a hearing on a wardship petition for a minor charged with a felony offense must be  
6 held by 15 days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would  
7 expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)).

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## THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to health and safety concerns resulting in substantial operational impediments, and the proclamations of states of emergency by federal, state, and local officials, it was determined that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115 were met with regard to the Superior Court of California, County of San Mateo (Court), as of March 16, April 1 and 10, May 14, and June 11, 2020. Based on those determinations, and at the request of Presiding Judge Jonathan E. Karesh, five prior emergency orders issued, authorizing the Court to implement certain relief under Government Code section 68115. Upon the renewed request of Presiding Judge Karesh, it is determined that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115(a) continue to exist (Gov. Code, § 68115(b)), and it is ordered that the Court is authorized to do the following:

- Hold sessions anywhere in the county, including in correctional and juvenile detention facilities, from July 15, 2020, to August 31, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(1));
- Declare that July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive, be deemed holidays for purposes of computing time under Welfare and Institutions Code sections 313, 315, 334, 631, 632, 637, and 657, if the above-described emergency conditions prevent the Court from conducting proceedings or accepting filings as necessary to satisfy these deadlines on those dates (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(5));
- Extend the time period provided in section 1382 of the Penal Code (section 1382) for the holding of a criminal trial by not more than 30 days, applicable only to cases in which the original or previously extended statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 15, 2020, to August 31, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(10); Executive Order N-38-20 (03-27-20));\*

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\* This authority supplements the authority to extend section 1382 deadlines previously granted in the March 23, March 30, and April 29, 2020 statewide emergency orders and in the June 11, 2020 emergency order specific to the Court. Accordingly, for any case in which the time to bring a defendant to trial previously was extended under one or more of those prior emergency orders, and the extended deadline


- Extend the time period provided in section 313 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be released from custody to not more than five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
- Extend the time period provided in section 315 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be given a detention hearing to not more than five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
- Extend the time periods provided in sections 632 and 637 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending wardship proceedings and charged with a felony offense must be given a detention hearing or rehearing to not more than five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
- Extend the time period provided in section 334 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a juvenile dependency petition must be held by not more than 15 days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from July 13, 2020, to August 11, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)); and
- Extend the time period provided in section 657 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a wardship petition for a minor charged with a felony offense must be held by not more than 15 days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline

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falls within the above-specified time period, this order authorizes the Court to extend the previously extended deadline by up to an additional 30 days. For any case in which the initial section 1382 deadline falls within the above-specified time period and is not governed by a prior emergency order, this order authorizes the Court to extend the time to bring a defendant to trial by a total of up to 30 days.
