COVID-19 ORDER NUMBER 13

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to health and safety concerns resulting in substantial operational impediments, and the proclamations of states of emergency by federal, state, and local officials, it was determined that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115 were met with regard to the Superior Court of California, County of San Mateo as of March 16, 2020; April 1 and 10, 2020; May 14, 2020, June 11, 2020 and July 13, 2020. At this Court's request, the Chief Justice of the California Supreme Court issued five prior emergency orders, authorizing the San Mateo County Superior Court to implement certain relief pursuant to Government Code section 68115. Upon the renewed request of this Court, the Chief Justice has determined that the conditions, as described in Government Code section 68115, continue to exist. (Gov. Code, § 68115(b). See attached Order.) Therefore, this Court orders the following:

- August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive, are deemed holidays for purposes of computing time under Welfare and Institutions Code sections 313, 315, 334, 631, 632, 637, and 657 (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(5));

1 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 313 of the Welfare and Institutions Code
2 within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be released from
3 custody to five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would
4 expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
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6 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 315 of the Welfare and Institutions Code
7 within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be given a
8 detention hearing to five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline
9 otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, §
10 68115(a)(11));
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12 •The Court extends the time periods provided in sections 632 and 637 of the Welfare and
13 Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending wardship proceedings and
14 charged with a felony offense must be given a detention hearing or rehearing to five days,
15 applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August
16 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
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18 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 334 of the Welfare and Institutions Code
19 within which a hearing on a juvenile dependency petition must be held by 15 days, applicable
20 only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to
21 September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)); and
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23 •The Court extends the time period provided in section 657 of the Welfare and Institutions Code
24 within which a hearing on a wardship petition for a minor charged with a felony offense must be
25 held by 15 days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would
26 expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)).


THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to health and safety concerns resulting in substantial operational impediments, and the proclamations of states of emergency by federal, state, and local officials, it was determined that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115 were met with regard to the Superior Court of California, County of San Mateo (Court), as of March 16, April 1 and 10, May 14, June 11, and July 13, 2020. Based on those determinations, and at the request of Presiding Judge Jonathan E. Karesh, six prior emergency orders issued, authorizing the Court to implement certain relief under Government Code section 68115. Upon the renewed request of Assistant Presiding Judge Leland Davis III, it is determined that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115(a) continue to exist (Gov. Code, § 68115(b)), and it is ordered that the Court is authorized to do the following:

- Declare that August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive, be deemed holidays for purposes of computing time under Welfare and Institutions Code sections 313, 315, 334, 631, 632, 637, and 657, if the above-described emergency conditions prevent the Court from conducting proceedings or accepting filings as necessary to satisfy these deadlines on those dates (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(5));
- Extend the time period provided in section 313 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be released from custody to not more than five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
- Extend the time period provided in section 315 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending dependency proceedings must be given a detention hearing to not more than five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));

- Extend the time periods provided in sections 632 and 637 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken into custody pending wardship proceedings and charged with a felony offense must be given a detention hearing or rehearing to not more than five days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11));
- Extend the time period provided in section 334 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a juvenile dependency petition must be held by not more than 15 days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)); and
- Extend the time period provided in section 657 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a wardship petition for a minor charged with a felony offense must be held by not more than 15 days, applicable only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from August 12, 2020, to September 10, 2020, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12)).
